mended for transplanting.

- •Also included is a column for when to plant everything. Select a small plant starter OR
- •Grow indoors for a month before transplanting outdoors.

FLOWERS

- •Know if you have a high salt content in your soil Extension office The amount of salt in your soil will determine what you can grow.
- •Lots of colorful Annuals: Impatiens, Petunias, Geraniums, Snapdragons, Pansies,
- •Coleus (lots of color), Caladiums, Kale – Sun, Shade, Part Sun-Part Shade –
- •Check instructions

- •Some of the Many Perennials: Plumbago, Coral Honeysuckle, Mexican Sage, Firebush,
- •Clerodendrum (Blue Butterfly Plant, Coreopsis, Bolivian Sunset Gloxinia, Canna)
- •Coneflower, Gaillardia, Zinnias, Lantana, Butterfly Bush, Verbena − All of these are sun lovers ~ Add 2-3 Fertilizer, Water frequently

•FLOWERING TREES

- •Some native trees to check out: Loblolly-bay, Magnolias, Flatwoods Plum, Chickasaw Plum, & Carolina Laurel-cherry
- •Beauty Berry

DERELICT BOATS IN THE LAGOON

We've all seen the abandoned boats increase in the Lagoon. Matt Culver, coordinator for Brevard County's Boating and Waterways Program, says, "Some are fully sunk and are hazards to navigation. Others are environmental hazards because they may leak fuels and chemicals. When they sink, they rip up the seagrass, which the fish need to survive."

Brevard's homeless often set up camp in boats that could sink at a moment's notice. Owners are responsible but "they are typically fixer-uppers someone bought without considering that it may take \$5,000 to bring them back to working condition," and are unable to afford the repairs or removal.
